Dan Corson

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Dan Corson, Intergovernmental Services Director of the Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation (OAH), Colorado Historical Society, supervises local government, federal and state agency compliance, and federal and state tax credit programs. Corson, a former NAPC board member, has presented and moderated several national conference sessions. He practiced law for 20 years prior to obtaining a masters degree in historic preservation from the University of Colorado-Denver. He has served on boards and of local, state and national preservation non-profits as well as chaired the Boulder, Colorado landmark and planning boards prior to serving on its city council.

James Hewat

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James Hewat serves as principal preservation planner for Boulder, Colorado. He obtained his bachelors degree in art and architectural history from Concordia University, Montreal, and masters degree in historic preservation from the University of Pennsylvania. Hewat's prior employment has included supervising historic preservation planner in Santa Fe, New Mexico state historic preservation office, Maine historic preservation office, and several positions as conservator. Hewat participated in authoring energy efficiency guidelines for Boulder's historic districts and landmarked properties.

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Mike Jackson, FAIA is the Chief Architect of the Preservation Services Division of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency (IHPA). He is also a visiting professor of architecture at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Jackson holds degrees from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and Columbia University in New York. He is a founding member of the Association for Preservation Technology Committee on Sustainable Heritage and active in the development of green building standards and preservation policies. He has been active in the field of historic preservation throughout his career and has been a leader in the areas of Roadside Architecture, Main Street, the Recent Past and Sustainability.

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Jo Ramsay Leimenstoll is a preservation architect and professor in the UNC-Greensboro Department of Interior Architecture where she teaches advanced interior architecture studios as well as courses in preservation theory and architectural conservation and a summer preservation technology field school. Jo is also a principal and owner of Ramsay Leimenstoll, Architect. Concurrent with teaching since 1983, she maintains a small architectural practice specializing in the restoration and rehabilitation of historic buildings and consults on design guidelines for historic districts and preservation-related planning issues. She has developed design guidelines for historic neighborhoods in 15 communities from Atlanta, Los Angeles and Des Moines to a dozen in North Carolina.
